Christian Aid Week this year runs from 11th to 17th May. This is the week when we rely heavily on our volunteers to deliver those distinctive red and white envelopes through every door in Moffat, Beattock, Wamphray and

Johnstone Bridge. We are always looking for new volunteers to help with this task, so please let us know if you are available to help during that week.

Since Covid, our collection process is quite different. We are asking those people wishing to donate to return the envelopes to us, by dropping them off at specific locations, details of these locations are printed on a label on the red envelope. We hope this year we can raise at least the same amount as last year, which was £2459. Every year Christian Aid, as a global organisation, is doing more than the year before, the times we live in are creating greater and greater needs.

Guatemala is one region of particular concern for Christian Aid; <u>half of all children are chronically malnourished</u>, leading to stunting that permanently affects both physical and mental development. The indigenous farmers are severely affected by extreme temperatures, their crops fail for lack of water. There is a double injustice taking place for local farmers of Guatemala; they have done the least to cause the climate crisis, yet they endure its impact most. On top of that, Industrial plantations nearby are using up the river water and natural resources to produce food for the world's richest countries, while the locals go hungry. How can that be right? Something has to be done to fix this!

You would be forgiven for thinking you are too far removed from these people to be of any help, but that is not the case. By supporting Christian Aid in whatever way you can, you make it possible to touch their lives for the better. Christian Aid is providing training for farmers to change their crops to be more resilient and tools to help them make that change. Christian Aid stands side by side with the poorest communities at the front line of poverty and exploitation across the world.

This year's Christian Aid Week in Moffat will be launched with a musical event taking place at UAPC on Saturday 10th May; a 30 piece band called 'Heart and Soul' will perform between 3 & 5pm. Later in the summer we plan to host a Ceilidh, which is a great opportunity to socialise as a family. Look out for posters of this coming event.

Please consider going the extra mile to help Christian Aid do what it does best; reaching out in love and kindness to help those affected by injustice, poverty and war.

Dear friends,

It is amazing how not long ago many of us were fed up with 2024 but who ever thought March 2025 will come by quickly and in a few weeks Ash Wednesday will be here and many of us will be observing Lent. Many people choose to fast by giving up a favourite past time like watching TV, eating chocolate or drinking alcohol. Many set aside a time to praise and worship the Lord; to read the Bible more, and to pray more often. But the truth is many anticipate deeper intimacy with the Lord or crave to feel Gods presence.

In the Old Testament, the recognised symbol of God's presence was the ark of the covenant- which sadly was taken from the Israelites. When King Solomon had finished building the temple he prepared the inner sanctuary where the ark of the Lord was placed.

King David with his abled young men went to Judah to bring the ark back, David had asked, 'How can the ark of the Lord come back to me'. Since, all efforts to bring it back had failed. Someone had suggested to use a cart, another suggested to get Uzzah (whose name signified strength) and Ahio (Brotherliness)- the two would Drive the cart- David did everything in his way, and everyone agreed and thought it was a great idea too. But the Lord's anger burned against Uzzah. When you read in earlier text God had already told the Israelites that the ark must be carried on the shoulders of anointed priests (those who knew how to). The ark was no common thing, just like Lent- we ought to know the real meaning and purpose of the 40days of lent- we need to truly realign our desires with That of God's we need to walk in Love, humility and obedience Deuteronomy 30:9-10 'Then the Lord your God will prosper you abundantly in all the work of your hand, in the offspring of your body and in the offspring of your cattle and in the produce of your ground, for the Lord will again rejoice over you for good, just as He rejoiced over your fathers; if you obey the Lord your God to keep His commandments and His statutes which are written in this book of the law, if you turn to the Lord your God with all your heart and soul.'

Whatever we practice in the coming weeks, let us seriously take a time of repentance - being aware that it is sin that is separating us from God, but we look to Christ for he endured the cross to save you from sin, death and the evil one. Let us be led to the gratitude of Christ.

GOD ONLY KNOWS- The trouble with recognising the 'real deal'.

If someone asked the question, 'Who is the most listened to keyboard player of all time?' probably a range of answers would come out- everyone from Liberace to Elton John, Franz Liszt to Rik Wakeman, perhaps even Jerry Lee Lewis. No-one can say definitively, but a name that would certainly be close to the top of the list might come as a bit of a surprise. The name is Greg Phillinganes. 'Greg who?' I hear you ask.



Greg Phillinganes is an immensely talented multi-instrumentalist who has toured and recorded with a broad array of artists including Stevie Wonder, Eric Clapton, David Gilmour and Toto. But what probably makes him the most listened to keyboard player of all time is the work he did with Michael Jackson on 'Thriller', the biggest selling album of all time.

The other week I heard something that took me aback. Running through the album's title song is a very recognisable bass line- actually played on a keyboard- by Greg Phillinganes. The whole song is a very complex production with many different parts all expertly crafted into one by the late great Quincy Jones. But running pretty much throughout is that bass riff, underpinning the whole tune. A riff that only has five notes in it. Those five notes are repeated over and over again throughout the piece and totally underpin the track.

What surprised me was not so much that such a simple line of music could have such an impact simply by being repeated throughout the whole song; rather, it was the response from Phillinganes himself in an interview when he was asked whether he played throughout the song or whether the five notes had just been recorded and then replayed over and over on a 'loop'. Apparently, he gets asked that a lot and his answer is an emphatic 'No!'.

The interviewer pointed out that it takes tremendous discipline and focus to play those five notes in that sequence in exactly the same manner, over and over again- he plays the riff over 90 times. But Phillinganes tells us- and I quote- "the more you play it, the more the groove settles in on you.... You get into a zone. There's no need to cut and paste- any cutting and pasting would rob you of the joy of grooving for the five minutes". The joy, he says, is in the reality of the moment. I question whether any of us would have known the difference between him playing and recording every note throughout the song as opposed to playing the riff once and then pasting it a further 90 times. But for Gregg Phillinganes as an artist, his part in the creation was just as important as the end product. And it is part of what makes the end product real and worthwhile.

I contrast that with the fears expressed by Sir Paul McCartney on the Laura Kunesberg show a few weeks ago. He, along with others, has real concerns that the government appears to be planning to allow tech companies to 'harvest' all forms of art, without paying royalties to their creators, to use them in their artificial intelligence development. He mused on a recording that had been played of him singing the Beachboys' track 'God only knows'- a track he has never recorded. It was all done by Artificial Intelligence- A.I. to you and me

The joy of the approach of Christmas was tinged with sadness for all members of Upper Annandale Church as we coped with the shock of the loss of our Session Clerk, Donald Walker, who passed away suddenly, but peacefully at hone on 18th November. Donald was dearly



loved and appreciated by all who knew him in his Church capacity and more widely as a friend to all within the community.

The respect in which he was held was clearly evidenced by the numbers who attended his funeral service which saw the former St Andrew's Church filled to capacity. Our Minister, Rev Elsie Macrae, conducted the uplifting service with sensitivity and compassion. Donald's close friend and former Minister, Adam Dillon spoke movingly of his friendship



with Donald and Ann and the contribution which Donald had made in his time, as a member of the Kirk Session. If any further evidence was needed it was clear from the volume of letters, cards and messages of condolence received by Ann and the wider family. The common thread was one of deep Sympathy and regret at the loss of such a fine gentle man who never spared himself in demonstrating his care and concern for everyone he met. His deep and abiding faith was at the core of his life - an inspiration to all.

Donald was a Moffat man through and through by birth, education and as a member of the farming and business community. At the funeral service his brother Brian spoke warmly of their family life and of the distinctive path taken by Donald in broadening his career overseas in Zambia where his strength of will and character at that time underpinned his success as a leader and skilled farm manager in a demanding environment. His love of Africa, its people, landscape and wildlife remained with him throughout his life.

Engagement with the outdoors and the countryside had been important to Donald from his own early days when as an enthusiastic Scout he progressed to Queen's Scout level. He recognised the influence that youth organisations could play in the development of young people and was privileged to return to local Scouting as Chairman of the local Scout group - a role in which he demonstrated his characteristic energy and enthusiasm.

His service as Session Clerk of St Andrews in delivering its redevelopment and rebirth as Upper Annandale Parish Church was exemplary. His was a constant presence and his leadership, resolve and faithfulness steered this demanding project to successful completion.

Billions of pounds are spent each year on advertisements, slogans and musical jingles that get stuck in our heads, to try and attract our attention and grab our money.

Our favourite advert from the past can be visualised instantly when we hear just a note or two from its theme and how just hearing three little words can transport us to an event in history, a familiar place or recollect a song or film or an event in our lives. Here's a few to think of: -

"Dr Livingstone I presume"

"One small step"

"I'll be back!"

"Shaken, not stirred".

As we enter this Easter time, even more slogans and catch phrases, little words, will be thrown at us from every direction to try and grab our attention and especially our wallets. The real loser though, in all of this, is Easter itself, in that its true meaning gets lost.

Ask most people what they think of Easter, and they will say such things as: -

"The easter bunny"

"Cadbury's chocolate eggs" (other brands available)

"Time for holidays".

So, let's get back to our Heading, "the most important words ever said." Now I understand this is quite a claim but let us return to the reason why we celebrate Easter in the first place.


Well, here we are into another busy year.

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PRESBYTERY REPORT

Presbytery met on 3rd December 2024 online (via Zoom) at 19.00.

The meeting was constituted at 19.00hrs by the Moderator, Rev Andrew Morton and key points of note are as follows:

SAFEGUARDING COMMITTEE: A lot of discussion in the committee was regarding the forthcoming change in legislation in relation to the PVG (Protection of Vulnerable Groups scheme). This has necessitated the Safeguarding Office conducting a deep cleanse of congregational registers. (SG7s). This has involved all congregations and has highlighted just how out of date some registers have been

Congregations should submit their Congregational Safeguarding Registers and Congregational Safeguarding Audits by 31st March each year, either to the Presbytery Office or direct to the Safeguarding Officer.

The Safeguarding Committee continue to request help to find people willing to become Safeguarding Trainers to deliver the ever increasing requests for training.

FINANCE COMMITTEE: Presbytery dues for 2025 will need to rise to 2% of available income based on congregations 2023 accounts. This would raise in the region of £176,400. Presbyters may wonder why we need to raise so much money. The reason is that Presbytery needs to boost its reserves in order to ensure that they are sufficient to cover future salaries and expenses once core funding ends.

ORDER OF THE DAY: The Overture and explanatory notes thereon having been previously circulated the Presbytery Clerk explained the procedure prior to the Moderator inviting comment and discussion prior to the vote.

Presbytery Approved the Overture without amendment by 122 votes to 12

MISSION COMMITTEE: There is a project to develop new worshipping communities across our Presbytery. Brian Devlin, our Mission Facilitator, leads this project working closely with Rev Gavin Niven, the Convenor, and Rev Neil Urquhart, Brian's linemanager.

<u>Update</u>: A Learning Community will start on 28th February 2025. There is still room for other churches to send a team on this. Interested parties should contact Neil Urquhart (nurquhart@churchofscotland.org.uk) or Brian Devlin (bdevlin@churchofscotland.org.uk).

Churches are encouraged to send a team on the Learning Community, which starts on 28th February.

PRESBYTERY REVIEW COMMITTEE: The report of the Presbytery Review Committee was presented but, after a vote Presbytery declined to receive it in its current form. The votes were 74 (61%) against receiving the report and 48 (39%) in favour of receiving it. The meeting closed at 21.40hrs

Session Clerk Report

Fellow members and friends.

As we come to terms with Donald's passing, I would like to say that we must all be strong and remember that we must carry on for that would be his wish, I am sure.

I felt privileged when the Session approved that I become the Clerk, and Andy Shuttleworth, Deputy Clerk.

We will work together alongside our Minister, Elsie, the Session and members of the Teams to continue the work started with Donald at its helm.

The Redevelopment of the building has now reached its conclusion which will allow us to go forward and plan the next stage, bringing all the members and supporters of the Upper Annandale Parish Church together- all those who live in the parishes of Johnstone Bridge, Kirkpatrick-Juxta, Moffat and Wamphray- and welcome them to join us.

As we look forward to spring, summer and what the new year will bring us, we also make our plans for our church for over the coming months. The latter part of 2023 and 2024 were times of great change for our new congregation, in a 'new' building, with new facilities and possibilities. Some of the things we had hoped for have not come to fruition in the way we might have expected, while others have been hugely successful.

Of course, we still face several challenges, the most obvious of which is financial. Like everyone else, the last few years have put a strain on our budget with a decline in giving and fewer members- challenges which are faced by congregations throughout the Church of Scotland. But we are blessed with a great Fundraising Team who continue to do sterling work. They display amazing ingenuity in thinking up and developing new events where we can use the great space we have in the church and halls, not only to provide much needed income but, just as importantly, to develop our ties with the local community.

One of the challenges we recognised from the very start of our new church was that of maintaining links with those in the former parishes of Johnstone Bridge, Kirkpatrick Juxta and Wamphray. We made a real start on that in January last year with the first of our 'praise evenings' in Beattock Village hall, and these have gone from strength to strength. A very different style of worship to our typical Sunday morning, these lively praise events give us a great opportunity to worship God in songs, old and new and to really let our hair down (at least those of us who still have it!).

In addition to those who have attended over many years, it has been great to see so many 'new' faces coming on a Sunday morning to join in worship and fellowship. There is a real 'buzz' about the church on a Sunday morning, with fellowship enjoyed both before and after the service, the latter being over a cup of tea or coffee and often home baking.

Eye Care Project 2024

An eye care health clinic in collaboration with Kawolo Hospital was carried out with the support of a team of eye surgeons from Spain in November who provided treatment and performed surgeries for various eye conditions. Our dedicated team and volunteers worked hard to raise awareness and ensure the community was ready for the health camp.

Umoja House:

The centre has been cultivating community over the years, this facility is expected to provide more community space for our work, and will also offer the opportunity to house some of the social enterprises we hope to have like a bakery, a tailoring classroom, a community library, a proper sign language section for our deaf community and above all a community hall that will facilitate community conversations .

Harmony of Hope Concert.

The concert celebrated 25 years of the Centre's dedication to the community, featuring an orchestra band that uses music to inspire social change. A group of 42 volunteers from Spain recently visited the Kitega Community Centre in Uganda, where they made a wonderful impact with their work and made the Harmony of Hope Concert possible in Kampala. It was attended by the Spanish consul to Uganda, adding to the event's significance. During their nearly two-week stay, the volunteers participated in various projects, learning about the Centre's mission and experiencing everyday life in Uganda. The time spent at Kitega left the volunteers feeling grateful and inspired. Many described their experience with words like hope, joy, love, and community. Their visit not only strengthened ties between the two communities but also highlighted the power of music and volunteer work in creating positive change.

New Development at the Centre.

Our community football pitch remains a lively gathering place, fostering connections and serving as a resource for local schools and residents as well as being an income generating project for the centre.

Kitega Community Centre 2024 Activity Highlights. Update on everything that happened in the year 2024. The Centre Children:

Five new students have started at the centre, increasing our numbers to 40 regular students which is just a fraction of the many who are still waiting to be admitted. The team supported by local

and international volunteers has done a great job supporting learning for children with disabilities and closely looking at their livelihoods

Project porridge:

This continues to have amazing results and because of this one of our partner schools has maintained a high number of school attendance. After increasing the attendance by more than 100% in the previous year, the school now has a higher pupil daily attendance rate. This is attributed to the project porridge provided to the whole school. Often this will be the only hot meal these children have in a day Over 400 pupils can now happily attend school every day and look forward to learning.

VICOBA Plus

Through the self-awareness created by the model – many community groups are now looking at the individual and community sustainability of their initiatives. The excitement is real, people have been released from the odds and VICOBA Plus continues to present so many possibilities. Over the past months, the executive visited most of the members in different communities and recorded several success stories that highlighted the power of collective dreaming, what real community means, and reinforced by the definition of resources Individuals now have the confidence to lead their development and work towards achieving their dreams.

The VICOBAplus camp 2024 was yet another opportunity to witness the impact of VI-COBA plus, the camp. Joy and gratitude summarised the camp in a testament of the power of community and what can get done when we all decide to work together for our communities.

Volunteers

Our local, virtual, and international volunteers continued to contribute tremendously to the work that we do. The centre received over 60+ international volunteers last year and it was exciting working with them as we built several communities.

Silver Jubilee – 25 years of the Centre.

The climax of the VICOBA camp was also the beginning of the 25-year celebration party for the Kitega Centre. Several activities were tagged to the celebrations for the Harmony of Hope event that happened in Kampala, Eye Care project that took place in different communities. We were grateful to various friends and supporters of the Kitega Centre for spearheading this.

The health centre in Katungulu:

Our community health initiatives are moving forward as we prepare the hospital for its upcoming opening. Structural work is almost complete, and we are now focused on getting the necessary equipment to register the health centre. The excitement in the village is clear, We are especially proud to have created a maintenance job for Kizito, one of our graduates with disabilities, who enjoys taking care of the hospital grounds. The health centre will make it possible for hundreds of community members to access quality healthcare.

One of the great aspects of our church is the variety of worship we can enjoy. We are grateful to Cheryl and her team for the advances that have been made in the provision of audiovisual and streaming facilities which contribute hugely to our services and other events. In particular, the ability of those who are housebound to watch services live, or recorded, is a real benefit.

Towards the end of 2024 we said goodbye to Kate Durran who had been our organist and, before that, the organist in St Andrew's for several years. However, we are delighted to have the services of Erin Bullard and, more recently, Charlotte Gibson to play for us on Sunday mornings. We thank them for sharing their gifts with us and look forward to hearing them on Sunday mornings (and perhaps other times too!). Music is a key aspect of worship, and it was great to receive the kind donation of the new baby-grand piano which now occupies its place at the front of the church. Between this, the organ and, of course, our praise band, we can enjoy a wide range of sacred and other music, both traditional and modern.

We encourage all to bring their talents and skills, whatever they are, to the furtherance of God's work in the church and the community.

As Andy and I learn how to hone the skills needed for our new roles, we encourage all to join us, "Many hands make light the work." There is a place for everyone so, please, do come along.

From the ever well supported Wamphray whist drives to Hamza Yassin and the Eagle Festival, the Scottish Fiddle Orchestra, the Budapest Café Orchestra with many more besides. The flexibility of our spaces has opened new doors for raising funds and it is my belief that there is a great deal more potential there still to be untapped!

Perhaps one of the biggest changes we have seen is in the nature of how we give to the Church. After making adjustments for the fact that St. Andrews was closed for much of 2023, there is little change between 2024 and 2023 in givings directly banked or given via the freewill envelopes. However, offerings made by open plate and donation have increased significantly in 2024. This is of course really good news and perhaps a reflection both of the many new friends that now worship regularly in UAPC, and increased numbers of visitors. One downside is that the Church is very limited in how much Gift Aid it can claim on open plate givings and donations. So I would urge anyone who currently gives by putting money in the open plate to please consider arranging to bank directly or to use Freewill envelopes. Both are easy to set up and confidential and for every £1 given, the Church would receive £1.25. That very quickly adds up!

The end of 2024 saw our Church's finances in a reasonably healthy position but we can never rest on our laurels. Fuel costs are set to increase again this year and we need to stay ahead of the game. However, I believe there is much to be positive about and I would personally like to thank everyone for their contribution to keeping our Church alive and at the centre of our community.
